



UCP of Orange County's *Life Without Limits* Golf Classic Returns to Santa Ana Country Club

Orange County, Calif. (August 28, 2017) - UCP of Orange County (UCP-OC) will hold its 23rd *Life Without Limits* Autumn Golf Classic at Santa Ana Country Club on Monday, October 16. An important fundraiser for the nonprofit UCP-OC, the tournament is a rare opportunity to play Orange County's oldest golf club following a major renovation of all 18 holes and other course amenities.

All proceeds will provide comprehensive services to more than 5,300 children and families with developmental disabilities including autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, developmental delay. A special feature during the tournament is when children and families served by UCP-OC participate as ambassadors and interact with players and supporters.

The golf classic begins at 11:00 a.m. with a shotgun start in a scramble format. Entry includes BBQ lunch, on-course activities and beverages, contests with high-end prizes, cocktail reception and dinner program with live and silent auctions immediately following golf.
